Voter Services and the Program Committee members are working together to encourage, inform, and register youth (18 -25) in our three counties area.


We have three events scheduled on Feb 14th

# The Importance of Black History

These places share stories of civil rights struggles and African American successes.

#### America's Black Holocaust Museum, Milwaukee

To honor Black history on a wider scale, visit the beautifully restored America's Black Holocaust Museum, located in Milwaukee and reopened in February 2022, 14 years after its doors closed to the public in 2008. At this historical and memorial museum, visitors are taken on a chronological journey through a U-shaped gallery space that shares information about the Black Holocaust from precaptivity to the present. abhmuseum.org

# Wisconsin Black Historical Society & Museum, Milwaukee

This museum's mission is to document and preserve the historical heritage of people of African descent in the state of Wisconsin. Its exhibits include a study on the labor experience of African Americans, the NAACP Civil Rights Tribute Bus exhibit, exhibits on the activism that led to the fair housing movement, the desegregation of school systems, and more. wbhsm.org

# Milton House Museum, Milton

The Milton House Museum is the last certified Underground Railroad site open to visitors in Wisconsin. The house operated as a stop on the Underground Railroad from its construction in 1844 through the Civil War. A guided hour-long tour takes visitors to the hexagonal inn and through the underground tunnel connecting to the Goodrich pioneer cabin. miltonhouse.org

## LWV-SCV POLICIES TO REVIEW

#### DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION (DEI) POLICY

The LWV St. Croix Valley is fully committed to diversity, equity, and inclusion in principle and in practice. Diversity, equity, and inclusion are central to the organization's current and future success in engaging all individuals, households, communities, and policy makers in creating a more perfect democracy.

There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of gender, gender identity, ethnicity, race, native or indigenous origin, age, generation, sexual orientation, culture, religion, belief system, marital status, parental status, socioeconomic status, language, accent, ability status, mental health, educational level or background, geography, nationality, work style, work experience, job role function, thinking style, personality type, physical appearance, political perspective or affiliation and/or any other characteristic that can be identified as recognizing or illustrating diversity.

# NONPARTISAN POLICY OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF ST. CROIX VALLEY

The League of Women Voters of St. Croix Valley is nonpartisan. As an organization it does not support or oppose candidates for public office, but rather acts only on those issues chosen by the membership for *study and action*. The League believes that political parties are essential to the American system of government and that the participation of informed citizens is beneficial to the political parties and to the system. Consequently, the League encourages its members as individuals to be active in political parties, in finding and supporting candidates for public office, and in seeking election to public office. Members of the League are not eligible to serve on the Board while seeking or

holding elected public office. While serving on the Board, a League member shall not seek nor hold state-level elective office, nor shall any officer or Board members allow her/his name to be used in support of any candidate or a state or federal office. In all other political activity, committee members shall participate to the extent the League nonpartisanship is maintained. There are no other restrictions on the political activities of officers and Board members, but it is the responsibility of the Board, individually and collectively, to ensure that the community has no reason to question the nonpartisan position of the organization.
