Opportunities to Help with April Elections

BE A POLL WORKER: Polling locations are in need of poll workers for this year's election cycle. Poll workers check in voters, help people register to vote, check photo IDs, and process absentee ballots. Check with your local clerk.

BE A POLL OBSERVER: Help the League of Women Voters of Wisconsin monitor Wisconsin's elections. They are seeking volunteers to be trained as Election Observers and placed in polling places in specific areas around the state. The League will provide your training. Voter Services (Patty & Rita) Visit Hudson DMV

Voter Services knows of leagues in WI that provide MyVote assistance to DMV clients. Each DMV Service Center in WI has a dedicated MyVote kiosk. In our three-county area, only Hudson operates with daily hours. The centers in Amery (Polk) and Siren (Burnett) operate two days per week each.

What an opportunity to assist with voter registration! We developed a plan and tested it out.

The first visit to Hudson DMV was to introduce ourselves/LWVSCV to DOT Supervisor Lisa Lee. Our plan was to *respectfully* inhabit their space and offer to assist anyone wanting to use the MyVote kiosk. Lisa was supportive and welcoming of our proposal.

On a second visit, Lisa had moved the MyVote kiosk from a dead-end, dusty corner to front and center of the lobby. The move accommodated us, taking up space, but it also made the kiosk more visible and accessible. She was thrilled with the arrangement, and we were delighted with the new location.

Our excitement tapered after the initial pilot of the program. After two hours, forty or so people had passed through the DMV. We encouraged them to stop at

the kiosk when they finished their DMV business. Many were happy to chat. Two stopped to check out the kiosk. They were registered voters but interested in the MyVote site.

This experience was pleasant but not the best use of time and energy. We will revisit this idea closer to the fall election. In the meantime, we continue to look for avenues that direct LWV SCV members' energy to register and inform our fellow citizens with the best use of time and effort.



High School Outreach

Some of our members are working to build relationships with high school staff to offer LWV SCV assistance with registering 18-year-olds. The process can be slow and uneven, but adopting a tortoise pace mindset has been helpful.

A 'foot in the door' approach is offering bookmarks like these that can easily be dropped off at a featured high school. The bookmark plays off the school's mascot on one side and on the back of the bookmark is easy access information for voter

registration.

Some League members show support for their community school and the League by 'adopting' a school. What this involves is donating the funds for the bookmarks and then taking the bookmarks to the local school.
