Thank you to all who were able to attend our Annual Meeting. For those of you who were unable to attend the following is an edited excerpt from my opening comments. It is a privilege to be your co-President. Thank you. (Beth Wood)

Welcome to the 2024 LWVSCV Annual Meeting – thank you for being here. We want this afternoon to be welcoming, enjoyable and efficient. So happy to see so many new members here today.

We want to help you find your place in the league. Our motto is Forward Together, and all are welcome.

You will notice a new look to some of our graphics. Leaning into our responsibility as a *nonpartisan nonprofit* we have embraced the Sunflower. Sunflowers and the Suffrage movement have been linked as early as 1867 in Kansas as the first attempt at full suffrage legislation was put to a vote. The bill did not pass, but the Sunflower image became a symbol of the cause and was chosen in 1890 by the National American Woman Suffrage Association to be used as their emblem.

The National and State leagues are providing us with very specific directives so that we can collectively optimize the time of our volunteers and maximize our readiness for the upcoming election cycle.

Many leagues are suspending their social events and putting all of their time and energy into projects that get out the vote and educate voters. Our intention is to find the happy medium, and our projects for the coming seven months will reflect that.

We are being reminded by the LWV that "optics matter". We must commit to always looking through the lens of DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion) and **nonpartisanship** as we gather and as we conduct ourselves publically. Especially those of us in leadership must be "beyond reproach". We are league members because we share a passion for policy positions, and we are committed to supporting free and fair elections. The responsibility falls on all of us to ensure that our communities have no reason to question the **nonpartisan position** of our organization.

Our messaging and our image must be protected and our integrity without question.

Let's enjoy our shared purpose by getting to know one another, to have fun when we gather and share the great feeling of being engaged in protecting our Democracy. Let's each commit to doing *one more thing* to move our league forward, together.

New Membership Model – How it will Affect our League

At the end of this year, LWVUS will be rolling out a new membership system, called ChapterSpot. We will be required to make changes to our Bylaws to reflect the new Membership model. This change is at the directive of LWVUS and LWVWI.

All Leagues across the County at both the local and State levels will make this transition together, and instead of dues collection at the local level, dues will be collected at the National level, LWVUS will retain 33% of dues, State will receive 47% and the local League will receive 20%. New members will be able to join and existing members will renew online through a link on our website—or mail in your paperwork. Both credit cards and checks will be accepted.

Why is the League changing its membership structure?

- 1) To implement a multi-stage, multi-year inclusive process that increases and diversifies League membership and strengthens League operations across the nation to deliver on our mission work and build league power.
- 2) To provide consistent and aligned membership system across all levels of the League that will eliminate financial barriers to participation, create an equitable division of dues between levels of the League, and overall, simplfy the mechanics of joining the League.

Donations

For the LWVSCV to retain 100% of your donations, we will ask our members to donate directly to our League via our website "Donate" button. This means that donations would be *managed separately* from when you join or renew your membership. If, in the past, you

have rounded up your membership with the intention of the extra money going to the LWV SCV you need to know that LWVSCV will not receive that extra money. All monies other than the membership fee need to be passed through our "Donate" button or made separately to our league via a check NOT through your membership dues.

Summary

What will change?

- Joining or renewing a LWVSCV membership
- Donations to LWVSCV during joining or renewing When will it change?
- The ChapterSpot system will be implemented late 2024 or early 2025 How does this affect me?
- Nothing changes right now and we will continue our current process.
- The LWVSCV website WILL NOT change, we keep our current website. Questions? WE ALL DO! We will continue to share the information from LWVUS as we

WIVEC Webinar - WIVEC will present the documentary "Suppressed and Sabotaged" on May 2.

"Suppressed and Sabotaged" is a powerful documentary about the growing threat of voter suppression and election sabotage to our nation's upcoming elections. In 2021, 19 states passed 34 new voter laws following the Big Lie of the 2020 election.

The film focuses on this recent wave of voter suppression and subversion laws

being enacted in states, and how the 2018 Georgia gubernatorial race between Stacey Abrams and Brian Kemp provides a case study for understanding today's voter suppression laws across the country.
