Thank you to everyone who helped make the Unite, Rise 8.5 kick-off on June 6, 2025 a gratifying and successful event. The LWVSCV hosted 40 members, volunteers and guests from 4:00-6:00 in Glover Park, New Richmond. Our

Farmers Market display tent was the hub of activity as we lined Knowles Avenue holding signs with messages such as Defend our Democracy, Preserve Democracy, Your Vote is Your Voice, Honk if You Vote, Protect Voting Rights, Protect Our Constitution and more.

Other activities expanded our voice for democracy, for example the New Richmond Library Director introduced an opportunity to write postcards in support of Library funding. The New Richmond City Clerk spoke on the importance of Voting and was available to answer any voting questions. Our Voter Services members provided the tent, wheel, candy and LWV materials as well as coordinating with the Library to have available yard games.

We are grateful to volunteers that helped with set up and take down. Our volunteer speakers were passionate and articulate about issues we all care about: Veteran Funding Cuts; Cuts to funding for prevention of Domestic Abuse; Protection of our Environment; The SAVE Act; Due Process and the League's position that we are in a Constitutional Crisis, the latter driving the Unite and Rise 8.5 nationwide campaign.







As we continue to move forward in this campaign we will learn as we go, experiment with ideas, opportunities and collaborations with other nonpartisan groups and continue to be a voice in our communities to effect change and form connections. Following the event, many of us gathered at Table 65 to enjoy a meal and conversation.

She previously taught history at MIT and the University of Massachusetts Amherst. HCR's response to misinformation about The Declaration of Independence is here, in the first video series of *Journey to American Democracy* called "*Ten Steps to Revolution*."

As people across Wisconsin and the nation gather to defend democracy and demand justice, we want to make sure you have the tools you need to protest safely and

confidently. Whether it's your first protest or you're a seasoned advocate, preparation is key.

The League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) and the ACLU have created essential resources to help protect your rights and your well-being when attending public demonstrations.
