It was another successful example of the power of collaboration which our League chapter is embracing to amplify our voice so more people can be duly informed.



Over 60 people showed up to listen to Jeff Leys, attorney, union staff representative, and life-long activist speak to the rights instilled in the Bill of Rights, the progression of State and Federal Rights, and the

current effect of the Supreme Court's decision to limit federal judges ability to issue nation-wide injunctions.

Folks gathered at the government


center in Balsam Lake (Polk County) to listen to a 90 minute presentation which included a question and answer period. Each attendee received a complimentary pocket reference "The Constitution

- □ THIRD! Confidentially the recipient's address is sent to you if you are making the delivery.
- □ FOURTH! Be discreet in conversations with others, respecting the privacy of the recipients.

protest or you're a seasoned advocate, preparation is key.

The League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) and the ACLU have created essential resources to help protect your rights and your well-being when attending public demonstrations.

- □ De-escalating tense situations
- □ Recording police interactions
- □ Knowing the risks involved with participating
