Following a sign rally attended by about 120 people, humanitarian activist Petrona Melgarego spoke at length about "the power of one" and how important it is for each of us to do what we can to help our

Over 500 dollars was raised to donate to Petrona's organization, the Los Amigos Program, which provides humanitarian aid to immigrants in our area. LWVSCV members actively work with Petrona and the Los Amigos Program as part

of our League's Immigration focus.

The Idea: We get together over coffee at JJ Levy's home in Osceola to discuss how to encourage voting with an emotional reach that is cogent, potent, and individualized. The backdrop to this idea comes from Deep Canvassing (DC), a form of canvassing that has increased voter turnout by 15%. Simply put, this is about having an authentic emotional conversation with a voter. Something all of us are drawn to or we wouldn't be in the LWV!

The Polk Burnett Indivisible steering committee invites you to a gathering of like minds to share ideas about next steps following the No Kings Day rally and other acts of resistance to date.

Background:

This event is part of Indivisible's next big thing to convert the energy behind No Kings Day into sustainable action. That is, they hope to generate thousands of gatherings across the country in early August and firm up people's commitment to *sustained resistance*.

The strategy behind these gatherings is based on how resistance movements have challenged autocratic outbreaks to varying degrees. There are no silver bullets, but there are ways to slow down the consolidation of power. The more successful movements have involved 3.5% of the population in a range of actions over time that undermine the pillars of autocratic power.

The goal of actions is to demonstrate non-cooperation and to disrupt their momentum in consolidating power, and to envision the renewal of democracy.

Effective action can be whatever you love to do. In addition to the typical actions (making calls to leaders, boycotts, letters, attending town halls, talking with neighbors), maybe we start adding art to inspire resistance (songs, poems, posters), mutual aid, making lemonade, or __?__(can't wait to hear your thoughts!). The power comes from us making community with kindness, decency, and caring, thus making society better along the way.

Why Attend?

The gathering is a way for us to digest the current moment, make/renew/expand your commitment to resist autocracy, and *make sure you don't feel stuck*. For some, hearing "you should get involved" can be paralyzing. What is valued as an act of resistance is only limited by our imaginations. Our discussion will hopefully help you tap into one thing that will feel right and powerful in this idiocy.

Don't Forget: This organizing strategy is building on successes. Our outcries about the ugly bill, sign rallies, protests have cultivated MAGA's doubt, and now Trump is sinking in polls. The people power demonstrated by national protests has empowered federal judges of all stripes to uphold the rule of law. True, we've lost the Supreme Court, but not all cases make it to them, so having a strong federal judiciary is powerful.

Finally, we are in huge company: Indivisible's July organizing meeting attracted 150,000 people (they "broke" Zoom), and from that, 5,000 people committed to host a gathering (4,000 more than they expected!!).

Your attendance alone will inspire others. Hope to see you on August 4th.

Four Pillars of Unite and Rise 8.5



Legal & Policy Advocacy: Challenge unconstitutional actions through litigation, advocate for electoral integrity reforms at state and federal levels, fight voter suppression, and protect due process.



Public Mobilization & Coalition Building: Turn out millions for quick activations and longer-planned activist campaigns, uplift local voices, and partner with grassroots, national, and international organizations.



Civic Education & Engagement: Launch public awareness campaigns, expand voter registration and turnout efforts, host educational forums, connect policy to real-life impact, and equip people with tools to act.



Democracy Resilience: Build lasting infrastructure to protect democratic values and institutions for the long haul.

UNITE AND RISE 8.5 | Power Playbook 2

About Unite and Rise 8.5

On May 1, the League launched the Unite & Rise 8.5 initiative, which aims to mobilize 8.5 million people using the power of voter engagement as a cornerstone of our democracy. Unite & Rise 8.5 showcases the many ways individuals can drive change through advocacy, mobilization, civic education, and engagement.

Micro campaigns that span 3 months each will unite communities, encourage the people to stand in their power, and demand a multi-racial democracy that works for all of us.

Playbook 1 (May - July): Shifting the Power Narrative

The first micro campaign focused on **shifting the power narrative**. It lifted up the voices and stories of those most impacted—immigrants and people of color—and made clear what was at stake by educating and mobilizing on the suppressive provisions of the SAVE Act, the lack of due process provided to immigrants, and the impact of the budget reconciliation legislation.

Playbook 2 (August - October): Holding Power Accountable

For the second micro campaign, we are holding power accountable. We focus on 1) defending and advancing voting rights, ensuring transparency and fairness in midcycle redistricting; 2) advocating for economic justice (budgets, reconciliation, Medicaid, SNAP, ICE funding and appropriations); 3) encouraging everyday democracy actions; 4) building a nationwide network of government and election observers; and 5) highlighting the role of the courts in our system of checks and balances.

 $This Power Playbook \ 2 is a guide that outlines strategic activities Leagues can take to participate in Unite \& Rise 8.5 from August through October of 2025.$

Navigating Nonpartisanship

During Election Cycles

When candidates are running for office, our nonpartisan stance is clear and firm: We do not endorse or oppose any candidate or political party. Through our state and local voter guides and VOTE411.org, Leagues work tirelessly to solicit and gather answers from tens of thousands of candidates around critical community questions.

These include questions about voting rights, climate change, reproductive rights, resource management, and more issues that affect the lives of Americans. These questions help voters decide on which candidate reflects their values and community needs. And while we provide voters with information on where candidates stand on key issues, host nonpartisan forums, and work to ensure every eligible voter has access to the ballot, our goal is to empower voters with facts, not to tell them who to vote for.

With Elected Officials

Once individuals are elected, they are no longer just candidates — they are public servants, responsible for representing all their constituents, regardless of party. Holding elected officials accountable to the public interest is not a partisan act; it is a vital function of a healthy democracy.

When we advocate for or against policies, we are doing so from our commitment to issues and strengthening civil institutions — not out of allegiance to any political party. We meet and engage with elected officials across the political spectrum to administer elections, provide critical updates and insights on how election administration works, and to facilitate civic engagement through things like election observation programs.

In essence, we are pushing for action on voting rights, democracy protection, and other key areas, without favor or bias.
